# **Resiliency and Faith**

As I write, we are preparing for the holiday season. In the US, Thanksgiving is quickly approaching. Christmas and New Years are not far behind. I have already seen people posting pictures on social media of decorated Christmas trees and sharing recipes for holiday foods. At the same time, the rate of coronavirus infection is increasing in ways that are out of control in the US while also rising in other ountries. Considering this I am drawn to consider how it is that we can go beyond just surviving but hrive and flourish? We are fatigued. When we are fatigued, resiliency is a resource that is in short supply.

To be resilient when in difficult situations or to thrive amid adversity requires the same thing: well-rounded self-care. We cannot escape the reality that life can be difficult. Some circumstances can be harsh or tragic and people can treat us in ways that are heartless and mean. Such are the aspects of life with which we all contend. What gets us through difficulties in life is understanding what it means to take care of ourselves: psychologically, spiritually, and physically.

But in this pandemic and during so much social upheaval, taking care of ourselves is challenging. It is difficult to maintain a positive outlook on life. Unless one already had a pattern of spiritual practice, it can be difficult to be focused enough to start. Caring for ourselves physically includes taking the pandemic seriously, limiting our activity, wearing masks, and washing hands.

Taking care of ourselves today requires that we allow ourselves to be safe and secure at home. To take care of ourselves means that we stay healthy physically and not put ourselves at risk of infection. Focusing on what we give up does us no good. Instead, we can care for ourselves when we are focused on the long-term benefit for ourselves and our loved ones.

Sometime in the future, I look forward not just to travel but to spend time with those close to me, to have in-person conversations over adult beverages, to relax and just be together. I look forward to returning to the performing arts and to experience the depth of energy that comes from live performance. I also look forward to singing in church: full-throated and out loud with others offering harmony and adding their enthusiasm. But none of these things will happen unless I take care of myself. In turn, those who are important to me must also take care of themselves.

Indeed, this year, what is most important is self-care so that we can thrive and flourish with our loved ones for years to come. By taking good care of ourselves, we are also taking good care of our loved ones. And that is a Christ-like thing.

A few of the highlights from our most recent Outreach Committee meeting are:

**Peace and Global Witness** – First Presbyterian Church (FPC) contributions totaled \$1,530 for this Presbyterian Church USA special offering, with 25% going to Wheeler Missions to help those in Bloomington experiencing homelessness this winter.

Area 10 Agency on Agency – The Outreach Committee would like to thank our members for their very generous donations to the annual Area 10 Food Drive on October 18. As you know, we were not able to collect food as we did in past years, but instead collected cash. You all responded by giving \$1,105 to the drive. What a generous response! The Area 10 people are very pleased. They recently have not been able to buy some of the food needed because they didn't have the cash to do so. Chris Myers, the Executive Director, wrote, "We love you! Thank you so much for all of your support!"

And, once each month, approximately 27 FPC members continue to bag and deliver groceries to local low-income elderly who cannot get out to shop.

**Monroe County United Ministries (MCUM)** – MCUM sends First Presbyterian a big thank you for the 650lbs. of food and several checks that members of the church collected for the recent Each One Feed Two food drive. Overall, 8,000 lbs. of food and over \$1,000 were contributed.

**Shalom Center/Beacon** – Despite the pandemic, several FPC members continue to serve Saturday morning breakfast to those experiencing homelessness, staying safe with masks, social distancing, and more.

**Wheeler Mission** – Ten to twelve First Presbyterian Church volunteers work together – while staying apart – to make sack lunches for 120 guests at the Wheeler Mission Men's Center. We began in May and have continued to provide lunches once each month. It is a huge help to the staff, and the men seem to love our lunches!


# 2020 PW woman of the year

## **Earth Stewards - December 2020**

#### Where will Environmental Policy Go?

With the election of Joe Biden comes the question of his plans for environmental policy. To define the challenges, are some of the environmental actions taken during the Trump administration that have direct impact on human health.

- In recent months the Trump administration has stripped protections from wetlands in ways
  that allow for the dumping of pesticides and other pollutants directly into millions of miles of
  streams and other waterways.
- The Trump administration altered automobile fuel efficiency standards to be less stringent, allowing more emissions of carbon dioxide.
- They have **relaxed rules on power plants designed to curb air emissions** containing brain-dam aging heavy metals such as mercury. The EPA also rolled back requirements governing how coal-fired power plants dispose of toxic wastewater, a move expected to add increased levels of lead, arsenic and other harmful contaminants to the environment.
- The EPA announced it would continue to allow the neurotoxic chemical chlorpyrifos to be used to grow food despite years of scientific research showing the pesticide damages babies' brain development. Residues of chlorpyrifos are commonly found in food consumed by young children. A USDA report released last year documented chlorpyrifos residues in raisins, peaches, mangoes and asparagus, among other foods.

Indiana is ranked among the ten states with the most air pollution. Will the Biden administration place renewed restrictions on polluters?

## Presbyterians For Carbon Dividend

Presbyterians For Carbon Dividend and it's Southern Indiana chapter are launching a Presbyterian Call to Action. Faith communities can be powerful and influential voices in Washington, and climate action appears to be at a tipping point. The conversation has ramped up and significant legislation will be introduced (or reintroduced) early in the next Congress. The goal is to ensure carbon fee and dividend is a foundational component of that legislation because P4CD believes it is the most effective and compassionate first step in supporting the transition to a greener, safer planet.

A number of lobby meetings are scheduled for early December, and P4CD hopes to present a letter of support from Presbyterians to our Members of Congress.
